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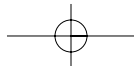
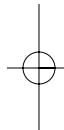
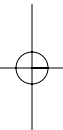

It is a great satisfaction for Spain to host the XXII IPSA World Congress in the very same year that we celebrate the bicentenary of the Cadiz Constitution. I thank all members of the Spanish Association of Political Science and Administration for making it possible for our country to hold this World Congress.

The Constitution of 1812 is a milestone of Spanish liberal constitutionalism; it is also an irrefutable proof that ideas, especially those of a political nature, have not known boundaries for centuries. Traces of foreign influence are evident in the Doceañista text, where echoes of Montesquieu and Rousseau are intertwined with elements from the Spanish political tradition.

Two centuries later, Spain is once again a hot topic among political science pundits at a time of transition and uncertainty. We just have to review the number of pundits, in the subject, that have been awarded by IPSA, to realize that the world we are living in has been modeled, to a great extent, by their ideas, approaches and schemes. I am referring to prominent names such as Giovanni Sartori, Charles Tilly, Juan Linz, Jean Laponce and Gabriel Almond.

Thanks to them, there was an extraordinary impulse and academic development of Political Science during the last century in the United States and Europe. During the 21st century, this energized effect has been transferred, to a great extent, to emerging countries, which are the protagonists of deep and fast transformations within the political sphere.

Political Science: The Challenges that Lie Ahead.

Opening address

I was never drawn to theories that propose “stages” or “phases,” or, more recently, “waves.” On the matter of globalization, my view, by extension, is that our interests should not lie in determining whether we are in the midst of a first or second wave of globalization. Of greater concern to me (and, I assume, for many of you) is the serious and worrisome economic crisis that is affecting a number of democracies and given rise to dire economic forecasts in some areas of the world, especially in Europe, and a much less worrisome economic growth that has also been affecting other political regimes, democratic and non-democratic, in other areas of the world, although in a differentiated way.

In confronting these phenomena, which are so crucial to people’s livelihood, a key question we should ask as political scientists is, “What are our democracies becoming?” Robert Putnam (2005) dubbed this a “mother in law” question, that is, one that “puzzles about the causes and consequences of major world events and seeks answers to questions our fellow citizens can readily understand.” I ask this question in the hope that it will provide fodder for further scrutiny. In the meantime, I will suggest some tentative considerations that may serve as a departure point for future research.

When analyzing these questions, as we all know, the first step is to frame them in such a way that they form a viable basis for empirical research. This can be achieved by breaking the question down into more specific questions. If we consider the analysis advanced by a number of authors (myself included) in works aimed at assessing democracy, some relevant and consequent empirical questions emerge: Will there be changes to various aspects of the rule of law, and how far-reaching will these changes be? Will there be changes at the state level as well? How and to what extent will key mechanisms of accountability be affected – or manipulated, as our Spanish colleague, José Maria Maravall (1996), has suggested? How and to what extent will welfare states be reshaped? How and in what measure will extreme economic and social inequalities be perpetuated without deeply transforming and seriously compromising the basic democratic values of freedom and equality and thus eroding the very fabric of democracy? And finally, how and to what extent will citizens continue to accept existing democratic institutions, or will they begin to reject them?

The theme of this year’s World Congress (“Reshaping Power, Shifting Boundaries”) and the manner in which it was presented entail a focus on all of these questions and a push to deepen our research.

From this perspective, I hasten to add three considerations that may point to some tentative answers to these questions. First, an intensive new research program on these questions – which have long informed classic political science research – must be developed, bearing in mind that our empirical findings, increasingly, are deemed to hold consider-

able relevance among our citizens. That said, they are also value-laden, as subsequent potential policies often imply difficult choices. Hence, careful attention must be paid to the methodological steps required to generate relevant and adequate empirical findings that scholars can duplicate.

Second, owing to the complexity of these questions and for other reasons, we must accept that different and equally legitimate empirical approaches, methodologies and techniques will be brought to bear on these questions, providing that subsequent findings are relevant and that the attendant policies improve our lives during these hard times.

Third, a more debatable consideration, when addressing these questions, concerns the necessity of sharing our research findings with the widest possible audience rather than remaining cloistered in our respective ivory towers. This is not the time to rest on our laurels, but it is the time to answer these questions in depth.

Allow me to conclude with an additional question, one that provides a partial answer or at least presents a key hypothesis for further study. In analyzing these questions empirically, are we actually looking for the democratic model we can afford, that is, one that is compatible with the resources available in every region and country in the world? In this vein, aren’t we looking for the ‘affordable democracy’ or for the ‘compatible democracy’? Moreover, should attempts to determine what is the ‘compatible’ democracy be among the principal tasks performed by political elites in government and in opposition? Is this not the kind of necessary responsiveness that political elites should provide during these hard times? And be able to communicate to people when their uncertainties, discontent and sufferance become widespread and are so openly expressed?

With this “mother-in-law” question and all related puzzles in mind, I hereby open the IPSA XXII World Congress in Madrid. May I also mention that we owe a special debt of gratitude to our program chair, Wyn Grant, for his effectiveness. Wyn has the unique ability to get things done without speaking too much. A special word of thanks also goes out to Secretary General Guy Lachapelle, who has skillfully steered this ship for a number of years, and to the IPSA officers who worked tirelessly to organize the World Congress. It would not have been possible for us to enjoy this great event without the constant dedication and commitment of Yee Fun Wong, Andrea Cestaro and Mathieu St-Laurent. We would also like to express our deep gratitude toward Juan Luis Paniagua and the entire Local Organizing Committee for their efforts in staging such a demanding World Congress amid such hard times for Europe and Spain.

I welcome all of you to Madrid. I hope that you enjoy rewarding debates and discussions with colleagues from all over the world and that your stay in this country beloved by many is a pleasant one.

A Word from the Program Chair



An Exciting Congress in Store

Welcome to the IPSA World Congress in Madrid. This year's edition promises to be particularly exciting, with a record number of papers and panels and big attendance. It also takes place amid a host of daunting global challenges, which are reflected in our theme "Reshaping Power, Shifting Boundaries." We chose well, I believe, when we selected the theme in Kiel in 2009.

The global financial crisis continues to pose major policy challenges for countries around the world, not least Spain, and it has rocked the foundations of apparently well-established arrangements such as the Euro zone. The worldwide growth of the Occupy movement reflects concerns about the growing gap between the global elite and ordinary citizens. There have been increasing demands for innovation in global governance and regulation, yet a disturbing absence of genuinely new thinking and paradigms is also observed. Our hope is that the World Congress can step into the breach.

The call for panels and papers drew an overwhelming response, as IPSA received 832 panel submissions and 5,255 paper submissions. The ceiling on the number of panels Research Committees were allowed to present was lifted, and many RCs responded in kind, reflecting their key and growing role at the heart of IPSA research activities.

As a global organization, IPSA has a special responsibility to be inclusive. This policy of inclusiveness extends to our colleagues from the Global South, to women and to graduate students. My only wish is that we had the funds to provide travel grants to a greater number of participants from the Global South.

The program is divided into four sections, in keeping with the standard format of our World Congress: the main-theme sessions, research committee or RC sessions, World Congress sessions and Local Organizing Committee (LOC) sessions.

The World Congress sessions (which I am personally responsible for) are not constrained by the congress theme, although many of the panels will invariably be linked to it – particularly if "shifting boundaries" are broadly interpreted as intended. I was particularly pleased, for example, to set up a number of panels on the role of social media in politics. Do social media have the transformative potential to challenge existing configurations in politics? In order to build on the success of the Spanish language sessions in Santiago, many of the LOC panels will be conducted in Spanish.

I am delighted that one of my former students, Pippa Noris, is giving a plenary address to the Congress. Pippa was a student of mine when I first began teaching, and she has long since outstripped me in terms of the range and rigour of her contribution to the discipline.

Staging a global congress is an extremely demanding task. I took the precaution of retiring a year earlier than expected just to work on the World Congress. I am grateful to the University of Warwick for providing me with the funding to hire a part-time assistant.

I also depended on the small but dedicated team at IPSA's offices in Montreal, particularly on our conference manager, Yee Fun Wong, and her assistant, Roksolana Bobyk. Both the Program Committee and the IPSA Executive Committee provided invaluable support, while Rainer Eisfeld played a significant part in liaising with our many Research Committees. Above all, I would like to thank the Local Organizing Committee, whose members showed exemplary dedication against a backdrop of very difficult economic and political circumstances in Spain.

The increased size and scope of this World Congress made the program planning that much more complex. At times it was difficult to meet each individual request for a specific time slot or sequence. In this, there are always lessons to be learned. Please speak to me at the World Congress or email me afterwards so that we can take account of your ideas and suggestions for the next World Congress in Montreal in two years' time. IPSA will now be hosting bi-yearly congresses – an apt reflection of the growing strength of our organization.

Madrid 2012

The Madrid World Congress comes at a turning point. In the aftermath of the Arab Spring, and at a time when European economic stability is threatened, the political science community is set to gather in Spain to examine the political and social factors that led to these ongoing crises. The reconfiguration of the world order always offers opportunities for change, just as it poses myriad challenges. Political scientists are often asked: What should we do? Over the last year, the Secretariat was flooded with calls to help fellow citizens follow the rule of law by implementing constitutional change and to promote democracy by asking our governments to act as stewards and demonstrate their political integrity. We call this "improved governance." This topic will be front and center at the World Congress.

The Madrid World Congress is also an opportunity to honour colleagues who have made important contributions to the development of our discipline and the professionalization of our activities. Leading the way is Serge Hurtig, who served concurrently as Secretary General and Treasurer (FNSP, Paris, 1960–1967) and dedicated himself to developing research resources such as the *Abstracts – La documentation politique internationale* – as a means to promote the research activities of colleagues in all parts of the world. This task was particularly daunting during the weeks and months after our association was founded. In 1952, Jean Meynaud added with a touch of humour: "The IPSA Secretariat (a slightly pretentious euphemism for one person being called upon to carry out all the everyday office work, including mailing and filing) is currently working all out for the World Congress at The Hague." (Letter to

William Robson, February 11, 1952). Some 60 years later, the IPSA Executive Committee is intent on honouring the persistent efforts of Serge Hurtig over the years. Without his contribution, IPSA would not be what it is today. Please join us for the special session on IPSA during the first 60 years.

IPSA will also present the very first Meisel-Laponce Award for Best Paper published in our flagship journal, the *International Political Science Review*. John Meisel and Jean Laponce co-founded *IPSR* in 1980. As past president, Jean Laponce was instrumental in developing our activities and fostering collaborations with institutional members.

The Madrid World Congress also marks the beginning of a new era for the Secretariat, one that will see our visibility enhanced worldwide. By hosting our WC every two years, the members of political science community will have more opportunities to share their views on the future of our discipline. Political scientists are needed to solve our societal problems, and the need to build better and more efficient political structures remains a core concern among the members of our discipline. I wish you all a pleasant World Congress.

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Spain

Spain is a diverse country located in the southwest of Europe. It shares the Iberian Peninsula with Portugal, Gibraltar and Andorra. To the Northeast it borders with France and the tiny principality of Andorra. As part of the European Union since 1986, Spain is a country of large geographical and cultural diversity. Its most significant change over recent decades has been the creation of seventeen *autonomías* - autonomous regions - with their own governments, budgets and cultural ministries. The old days of a unified nation, governed with a firm hand from Madrid, seem to have gone forever, as the separate kingdoms which made up the original Spanish state reassert themselves. And the differences are evident wherever you look: in language, culture and artistic traditions, in landscapes and cityscapes, and attitudes and politics.

Madrid

With a population of about 3.3 million (or over 6 million if you include the greater metropolitan area), the Spanish capital of Madrid is the third largest city in the European Union after London and Berlin. As the centre of political and cultural life in Spain, Madrid wields considerable influence in politics, education, entertainment, fashion, science and the arts. There is much to discover in this city, whose five centuries of history and wealth of cultural attractions contrast with modern skyscrapers and a thriving nightlife.

Communications

Internet

Most hotels offer wi-fi facilities in their rooms or through their Business Centers. Madrid is also providing free 30 minutes wi-fi connections across the city through clearly identified ("Pulgar Wifi") hotspots kiosks. In order to connect to these kiosks hotspots, you first need to find one showing the "Pulgar Wifi" logo. You then know that you are within range of one of these wi-fi areas and you will be able to connect. Activate your wi-fi device and look for a hotspot named "Quioscos WiFi Madrid", and you

should be able to connect and register. Madrid is also well-provided for with internet cafés and there are several throughout the city. Rates are very reasonable, between € 1 - 1.50 per hour. Many of these internet centres also let you call abroad for discount rates, fax, print and make photocopies.

Cellular Phones

Cell phones can be rented at some business centers of hotels. There are several good mobile networks throughout Spain, and it is usually easy to pick up a signal with a foreign mobile.

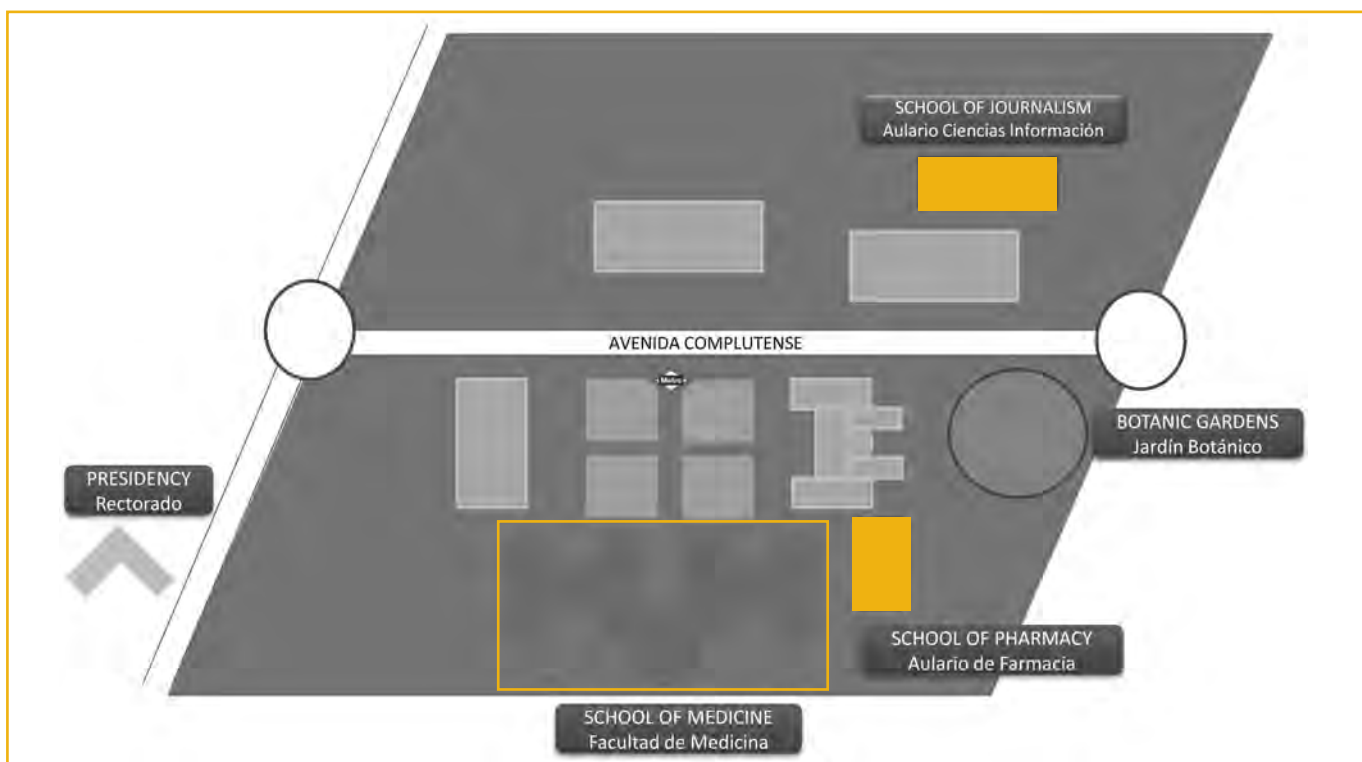
International and National Telephone Calls

The country code of Spain is +39 and the local area code for Madrid is 91. To call Madrid from abroad, dial 00 39 91 followed by the local number. International phone cards with cheap rates can be found at a variety of newsstands or tobacco shops in Madrid. Pay phones accept both phone cards and change. Phone rates for both national and international calls are cheaper after 10 pm and during the weekend.

Congress Venues

The IPSA World Congress is held at the Universidad Complutense de Madrid which is the largest university in Spain and one of the oldest universities in the world. The congress activities will be held at the Moncloa campus in the university quarter - Ciudad Universitaria which is also a station on Metro Line 5. While the congress activities are centred on the university campus, the congress accommodations are mainly located near the city centre in close proximity to many restaurants, museums, parks, local attractions and vibrant night life.

Electricity

Electrical voltage in Spain is 220 volts, 50 cycles (220V 50 Hz). Plugs have two round prongs and all electronic devices designed for 110V will require a transformer. All portable appliances, including portable computers, usually have transformers of high voltage (110V-240V) which are adaptable to the Spanish electrical system. Some hotels have 110V lines.

Gastronomy

Madrid and Spain is well known for its gastronomy. Going out for tapas is a very popular way to enjoy the culinary delights of Madrid. *Tapas* is a little snack you can have for lunch or dinner. The type of food can range from cheese, ham, fried calamari, anchovies or olives. Its origins go back to the XIII century, when **King Alfonso X** forced to the bar owners to serve food with wine, to avoid the alcohol's harmful effects. While Madrid has a big bar culture, it is quite normal to eat tapas as you go. You can eat tapas in almost every bar of Madrid and bars may specialize in certain types or tapas dishes. You can eat like a local and sample tapas from more than bar over the course of an evening. You should note that Spaniards eat dinner much later and most restaurants do not open before 21:00.

Health

It is recommended that visitors get their own medical insurance program to cover those expenses during their stay.

Please note that many of the hotels in the city centre are a short distance from popular public plazas and bustling nightlife districts.

Hotels

Money

Spanish currency is the Euro (€). Bills are of €500, €200, €100, €50, €20, €10 and €5 Euros. Coins are of €2, €1, 50c, 20c, 10c, 5c, 2c, and 1c.

Use of Foreign Currency

Cash in foreign currency is not generally accepted since Spain's official currency is shared with the rest of the EU. However, exchange facilities are available in downtown Madrid and at the Madrid Barajas airport.

Credit Cards

Credit cards are widely accepted including Visa, Master Card, Maestro and American Express.

Exchange

Exchange facilities are available at Madrid Barajas airport, most banks, hotels, and also along central streets like Gran Vía. The exchange rate is roughly \$1.00 USD = 0.8 euro.

Be aware that a credit card will not be accepted for the purchase of Euros at most banks, hotels and currency exchanges. You may use either a debit card or a credit card in an ATM machine.

Automatic Teller Machines (ATM)

It is easy to find automatic teller machines (ATM), which dispense Euros. They can be found in commercial and touristic areas. These 24-hour cash machines accept local bank cards as well as banking cards in financial networks such as Visa, Mastercard, and Maestro.

Taxes and Tips

Value-added tax (VAT) is 16% in Spain excluding food items, books and optics which have a 7% tax rate.

Tipping in restaurants is optional. Restaurant menu prices include a service charge, but it is always up to the customer to tip or not tip and always if you like the service. There is no percentage of the total, except in restaurants that you give around 5–8%. In the other cases you can give change (coins).

Opening Hours

The typical Spanish business day is generally cut into two by the lunch period. Many stores, for example, are open from about 9:00 until 14:30 and then again from around 17:00 until 21:00.

Banks are usually open from Monday to Friday, from 9:00 or 10:00 to 14:00.

Personal safety

Although Madrid is a safe city for foreigners, we recommend that you pay attention to your personal belongings and try not to walk alone at night, or too far away from where you are staying. Use your common sense to avoid any unfortunate encounters with bag-snatchers and pick-pockets. Please note that the police emergency number is 112, and the foreign tourist assistance service number is 901 102 112. This service is also available 24/7, and is useful in cases of credit card cancellation, contact with embassies and consulates or assistance to locate lost items.

Transportation

Bus (EMT)

The buses within Madrid are red, and called EMT (*Empresa Municipal de Transporte*). They can get you to any part of the city, and operate mainly in their own bus lanes, which helps them to avoid traffic. The buses operate between more or less from 06:00 and 23:30, depending on the line. From 23:30 to 05:00 there are night buses running, exact times depend on the line. The red bus stops are easily spotted and each has a timetable attached to it.

A single ticket is €1.50. The best value if you are travelling around Madrid is to buy a Metrobús ticket, which allows you 10 journeys on the metro or bus. This costs €9.30. You can buy the Metrobús ticket on the bus, in the metro station, newspaper stands or tobacco shops. You can also buy a Tourist Travel Pass (*Abono Turístico*) which is valid for either 1, 2, 3, 5 or 7 consecutive days. This pass permits unlimited travel on all forms of public transport within Madrid and its surrounding autonomous region.

Lifts and elevators have been introduced in a fair number of Metro stations of the Madrid network. Actually, there are 137 metro stations equipped with lifts, ramps or access at the same level that get in touch the outside with the hall and Metro platforms, making easier the transfer between them.

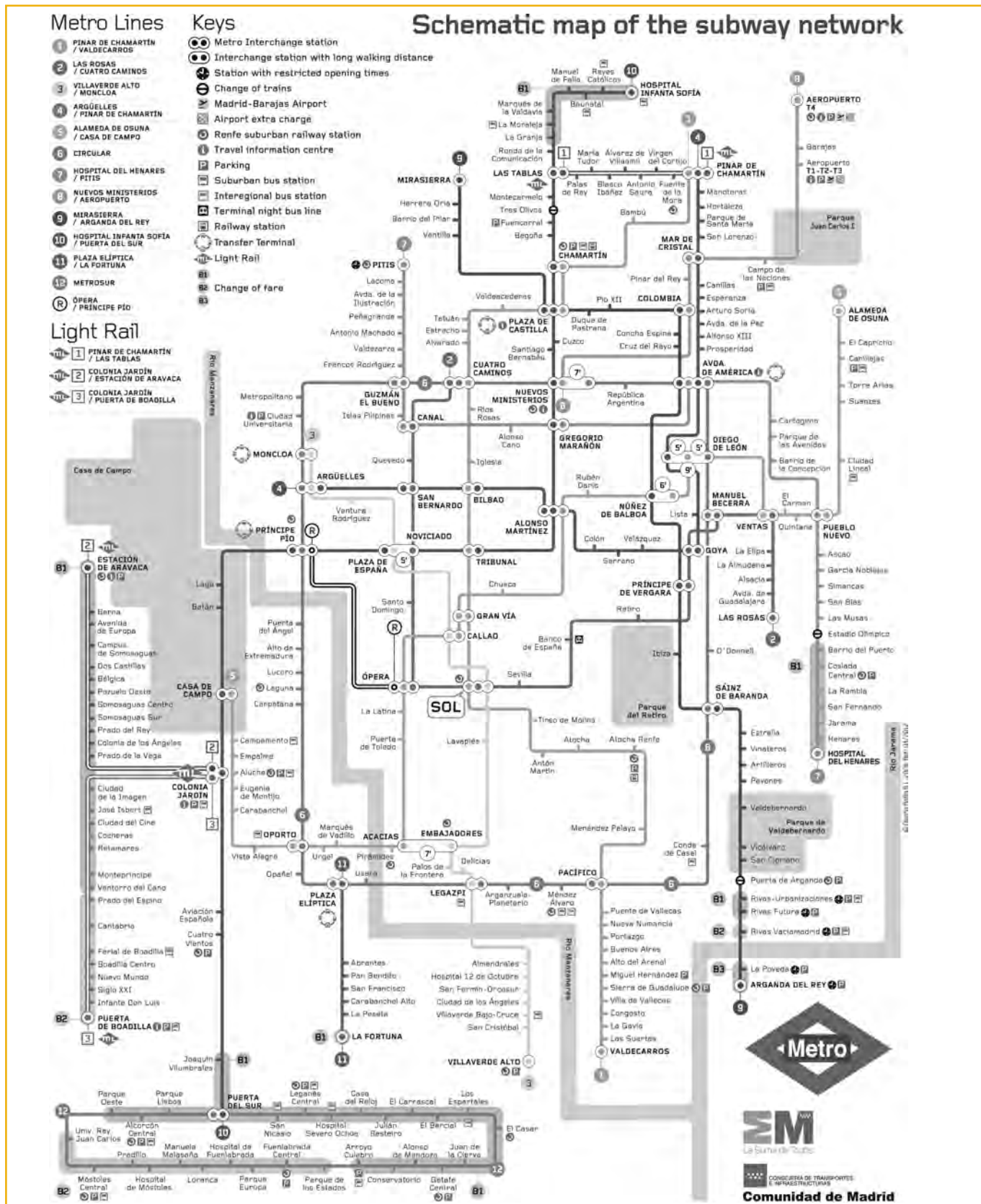

Metro (Subway)

Opening Hours:

All week from 06:00 to 01:30. Frequency of service changes on week-ends.



Car rental

To rent a car for a week can cost from 120 € to 200 € and most car rentals include unlimited mileage, third party insurance and all local taxes. As with many countries in Europe, you are permitted to drive with your normal licence at hand, provided it is written in the Roman alphabet. Holders of licenses written in another alphabet are obliged to show an International Driving Permit in English (widely available through motoring organisations such as AA, AAA, RAC, etc.)

Driver's license is needed at all times, and if your driver's licence has no photo you'll need another valid form of ID with a picture of you (your passport for example). Finally, remember to have your vehicle registration document (V5) and certificate of motor insurance at hand. Some Spanish car companies employ age restrictions, and you may be charged extra for being below the minimum age or above the maximum age.

Taxis

There is always an obligatory minimum fare of €2.10 from when the meter is switched on. There are 2 rates of pay, depending on whether or not you are travelling during peak or off-peak times. Weekdays the metre should indicate 'fare 1' from 06:00 - 21:00, and 'fare 2' from 21:00 - 06:00. During fiesta days the fare should be number 3.

If you pick up your cab at Madrid Barajas airport, there is an automatic supplement to pay of €5.50.

Any journey beginning from a taxi rank at a bus station, railway station or approach road to either will incur a supplement of €2.95. You will have to pay this supplement if you get your taxi from a taxi zone displaying the sign 'suplemento autorizado'. The sign is displayed on a plaque at the taxi rank, similar to a road sign.

Time zone

Mainland Spain and the Islas Baleares (Balearic Islands) fall under Central European Time, the same time zone as the majority of western Spain (GMT + 1 during winter and GMT +2 during daylight savings time). However, the Islas Canarias (Canary Islands), located out in the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Morocco, is in the Western European Time zone, meaning that it is one hour behind mainland Spain.

Travel to and from Madrid, Spain

Participants should make their own travel arrangements to and from Madrid. It is advisable to confirm your return trip on arriving in Madrid in order to ensure your flight on the date required.

From the airport to downtown Madrid

Most IPSA World Congress participants will arrive via Madrid-Barajas International Airport (airport code MAD), the largest and busiest in the country and the primary hub for Iberia Airlines, Spain's national carrier. Located 15 kilometres from the city centre, the airport has four terminals serving local and international carriers, and it is easily accessed by taxi or public transit via metro line 8. A taxi costs no more than 40 € one way, while the metro to or from either airport station is 2.50 €.

Units

In Spain, the metric system and the Celsius scale are used.

Water

In general, Madrid's drinking water is perfectly safe to drink. For people who are generally more susceptible to changes in their environments, we suggest drinking only bottled mineral water (you can choose between effervescent or carbonated water, "con gas" and water without gas, "sin gas") during your first days in Spain. Mineral water is commonly found in supermarkets, corner stores and restaurants.

Weather

Due to Madrid's high altitude of 650 metres, it experiences cold winters and very hot summers. July in Madrid tends to be quite hot with temperatures that are consistently above 30° C (86° F). The temperature ranges from 30° C (86° F) to as high as 40° C (104° F). Night time temperatures do not drop much lower than 18° C (64° F). As the climate is dry, the high temperature is easier to tolerate but it is still very hot. We suggest that light colored clothes and hats should be worn. During the summer months, it gets dark late and the city really starts to come alive in the evening.

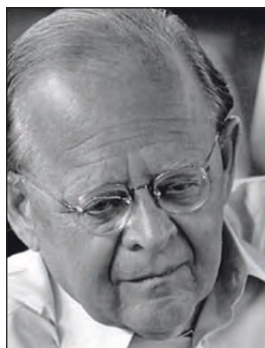
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Karl Deutsch Award



The purpose of the Karl Deutsch Award is to honour a prominent scholar engaged in the cross-disciplinary research of which Karl Deutsch was a master. The recipient presents the Karl Deutsch lecture or leads a special session at the world congress. The award is made on the recommendation of the committee on awards. It is supported by the Karl Deutsch fund.

Karl Wolfgang Deutsch (1912-1992)

Born in Prague, Karl Deutsch immigrated to the US in the late '30s. He taught at the MIT, Yale, and Harvard. He assumed the role of President of IPSA from 1976-79. He was also President of the American Political Science Association and director of the International Institute of Comparative Social Research at the Science Center in Berlin. He died in November 1992.

Alfred Stepan, Columbia University

Alfred Stepan is the Wallace Sayre Professor of Government at Columbia University. Previously he was a Fellow of All Souls College and the Gladstone Professor of Government at Oxford University, the first Rector and President of Central European University in Budapest, and a Professor at Yale. His books, translated into over ten languages, include: *Rethinking Military Politics: Changing Patterns in Brazil*; *State and Society*; *Arguing Comparative Politics*; with Juan J. Linz, *Problems of Democratic Transition and Consolidation: Southern Europe, South America and Post-Communist Europe*; and with Linz and Yogendra Yadav, *Crafting State Nations*; *India and Other Multinational Democracies* (2011). In the last year he has published articles on inequality in the USA in *Perspectives on Politics*; on the transition in Tunisia in *Journal of Democracy*; on Senegalese rituals of respect in *Comparative Politics*; and two co-edited volumes, *Rethinking Religion and World Affairs*, and *Democracy, Islam, and Secularism in Turkey*. He is an elected fellow of the British Academy and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Mattei Dogan

After his studies at the University of Paris and La Sorbonne, Mattei Dogan distinguished himself inside IPSA by founding and chairing the Research Committee on Political Elites (RC-02) from 1971-2002 and by being Vice-chairman of the Research Committee on Political Sociology (RC-06) from 1970-75. He has also been a main actor in almost all of the World Congresses of Political Science and of Sociology for the past 50 years.

Stein Rokkan Award



The Stein Rokkan Award is one of the IPSA travel grants that the association began offering its members in the early 1990s. The purpose of the Stein Rokkan fellowships is to assist a small number of graduate students to attend the world congress by covering their basic travel and accommodation costs. The recipients receive financial assistance towards travel and subsistence. The awards are made on the recommendation of the committee on awards, and they are supported by the Stein Rokkan fund. Stein Rokkan (1921-1979)

He was also Vice-President of the International Sociological Association, Chairman of the European Consortium for Political Research (which he helped found), and President of the International Social Science Council.

Awards

Francesco Kjellberg Award for Outstanding Papers presented by New Scholars



The purpose of the Francesco Kjellberg Award is to encourage young, new scholars to write and present papers at the World Congress of Political Science. The recipient is offered a complimentary three-year IPSA membership and travel costs to the following World Congress of Political Science. The award is made on the recommendation of the Committee on Awards on the basis of nominations by convenors and chairs at the world congress and is based on normal criteria of academic excellence. IPSA's own resources support it.

This award is given in honor of a distinguished Norwegian political scientist, Francesco Kjellberg. Professor Kjellberg was IPSA Secretary General from 1988 to 1994. His involvement with IPSA spanned more than 20 years. He was secretary of the Research Committee on Comparative Study of Local Government and Politics (RC-05) from 1976 to 1979, member of the IPSA Executive Committee from 1979 to 1985, and program chair of the 13th IPSA World Congress (Paris 1985). He was also secretary of the Norwegian Political Science Association and taught at Oslo University. He died March 1998.

Wilma Rule Award for the Best Paper on Gender and Politics



This award was instituted by the Executive Committee on the recommendation of the Committee on Participation and the Committee on Awards. It was designed to encourage research in the area of gender and politics and was launched at the congress in Québec City in 2000. It is given to the best paper in the area of gender and politics. The IPSA Awards Committee has recommended naming the award in tribute to the work of Wilma Rule.

Wilma Rule (1925-2004)

Wilma Rule received a B.A. in Political Science and in Journalism in 1949 and an M.A. in political science in 1950 from the University of California at Berkeley. Her Ph.D. was granted by the University of Hawaii in 1968. She was awarded a postdoctoral fellowship for the Inter-University Consortium for Political and Social Research at the University of Michigan and did additional postdoctoral work in organizational behavior at Northwestern University. She was an assistant professor at Northern Illinois University from 1969 to 1975. She served as long-time Secretary Treasurer of the Representation and Electoral Systems Section of the American Political Science Association.

Her study of gender and politics led to a lifetime of research on electoral systems and how they facilitated or hindered the election of women and underrepresented minorities to public office. Wilma Rule was a leading writer and political science researcher whose work resulted in a number of articles and books that challenge conventional notions about the reasons for the lack of political representation by women in the US.

Meisel Laponce Award



The Meisel-Laponce Award was created by the *International Political Science Review* (IPSR) to honor John Meisel and Jean Laponce, the first two editors of *IPSR*. The prize is awarded at every two World Congresses of Political Science to the best article published in *IPSR* in the previous four years. The prize is jointly sponsored by the IPSA and SAGE Publications. It is awarded for the first time in 2012.

John Meisel

Of Czech origin, John Meisel is the Sir Edward Peacock Professor of Political Science Emeritus at Queen's University. He is a Companion of the Order of Canada, a former President of the Royal Society of Canada and a one-time Chair of the Canadian Radio and Telecommunication Commission of Canada. Except for Visiting Professorships at Yale and in the UK, he spent his whole academic life at Queen's where he pioneered studies of elections and political parties, the role of government in the arts, the politics of regulation and challenges to national cohesion. He was the founding editor of *The Canadian Journal of Political Science* and of *The International Political Science Review*. Teaching, research, writing and nature have been his passions and he finds it hard not to get involved in issues affecting the common weal. He can be reached at meiselj@queensu.ca.

Jean Laponce

Born in Decize sur Loire, Jean Laponce studied at the Institut d'Études Politiques de Paris and at the University of California, Los Angeles. He taught at the University of British Columbia where he is now an Emeritus Professor. He also taught at University of Ottawa and at the University Aiki Shukutoku in Nagoya. Member of the IPSA Executive Committee from 1966 to 1972, he was President from 1973 to 1976. He joined John Meisel to co-edit the journal *IPSR* in 1985. He is the author of *The Protection of Minorities*, 1961; *The Government of France under the Fifth Republic*, 1962; *People vs Politics*, 1970; *Left and Right*, 1981; *Languages and Their Territories*, 1984; *Loi de Babel et autres régularités des rapports entre langue et politique*, 2006; *Le Référendum de Souveraineté*, 2010. He established, with Jean Gottmann, the IPSA Research Committee 15 - Political and Cultural Geography. He also created the IPSA Research Committee 50 - Language and Politics.
