

PSA Annual Conference 2017

In the modern world, where the network of mutual dependencies is thickening, social and political processes are resonating more widely, their range is expanding and scale is growing. Conducting analyses in political science outside the international context is becoming unfeasible. In order to fully comprehend global processes, cooperation across state borders and international exchange of ideas are indispensable.

This is the role of the World Congresses of Political Science.

For the first time since the 1979 World Congress in Moscow, IPSA will hold its Congress in an East European state. I am proud that outstanding political scientists from all over the world have selected Poznań as the venue of their sessions. This is a great distinction for Poznań as a city and an academic center, which is among the best in Poland and -I am convinced - is becoming increasingly important in Europe.

The main theme of the Congress shows that modern political science is keeping its eye on the ball, watching social transformations and global processes. Politics in the modern world are actually the "politics in the world of inequality." You are going to analyze issues that are essential for global order.

I am convinced that the circle of such outstanding scholars will be able to answer at least some of the questions posed by modern political science and, equally importantly, to ask new ones.

I wish you fruitful and inspiring sessions. I believe that your stay in Poznań will allow you to establish valuable international academic relations and result in numerous joint research projects. I hope that the Congress will allow political science to take a few steps forward.

With great appreciation for their efforts, we asked the Turkish LOC and the TPSA to understand the reasons for our decision. It remains IPSA's firm hope that we can hold a future World Congress in Istanbul.

Although the decision to relocate was painful and disappointing for all involved, particularly for our Turkish colleagues, we are at the same time very proud to present the World Congress here in Poznań. The IPSA Secretariat in Montréal worked diligently to organize a thorough bidding process to determine a new venue for the 24th World Congress, and Poznań's candidacy proved to be outstanding, with the enthusiastic support of the Polish Political Science Association, which set up a new LOC to help organize this World Congress, under the leadership of Roman Bäcker and Teresa Sasinska-Klas. Holding the IPSA World Congress in Poland also has a special symbolic meaning, as Poland is situated at the crossroads between East and West, thus carrying forward IPSA's goal to open up to the non-Western world. We congratulate the efforts and enthusiasm of the Polish Political Science Association to maintain this goal.

Political scientists from all over the world will contribute to debates around the theme of inequality at the 24th World Congress. IPSA thereby hopes to foster a global conversation that advances our knowledge and understanding of these issues. We are pleased to have you among us.

We owe a debt of gratitude to those who made this World Congress possible. The IPSA Program Committee — and Program Co-Chairs Dianne Pinderhughes and Marian Sawer — did an excellent job of organizing this event. Thanks also to the Polish Political Science Association, and the entire LOC for their remarkable efforts. Welcome to the 24th World Congress of Political Science, taking place in the historic city of Poznań. Poznań is a university town, with around a quarter of its population being students. Its impressive Congress Centre was the site of the 2008 UN Climate Change Conference.

We are pleased to have worked on this 24th Congress, and to have shepherded it from its initially scheduled location in Istanbul, to its present site, where it will be the largest IPSA Congress ever held, with the exception of the Madrid congress in 2012.

We developed the Congress theme, 'Politics in a World of Inequality' in consultation with the Program Committee, Executive Committee and Local Organising Committee. The aim was to refocus attention on the distributional issues summarised by Harold Lasswell as 'Who gets what, when, how'. Participants from all over the world have responded enthusiastically to the challenge of showing how the different subfields of political science can help us understand the causes and consequences of inequality and how political inequality can be addressed.

We had an overwhelming response to our call for panels and papers, receiving 1372 panel and 6844 paper proposals in all. Reviewing all these proposals was a mammoth task for our Main Theme and Research Committee chairs. There are many exciting panels dealing with a wide range of inequalities in both global and local contexts as well as the strengths and weaknesses of political science as a discipline in recognising and addressing such inequalities. Our first plenary speaker, Richard Wilkinson, will launch the theme of the Congress with an inspiring address on inequality as 'the enemy between us'.

In February 2016 the IPSA Executive made the decision to relocate the 24th World Congress, due to security concerns in Istanbul. This was a very hard decision, given all the work already undertaken by our Turkish colleagues in preparing for the Congress. It required a new bid process, leading to the choice on 23 March of Poznań as the new location for the Congress. This relocation only a few months before the Congress meant a huge amount of additional work for the IPSA Secretariat and for session chairs, as well as the creation of a new Polish Local Organising Committee headed by Roman Bäcker and Tadeusz Wallas and an accelerated call for papers. Our Polish colleagues put their hearts and souls into making the Congress a magnet for political science in the region as well as shining light on political developments in Central and Eastern Europe.

The leaders of IPSA's Congress team were Yannick Saint-Germain (Event Project Manager) and Roksolana Bobyk (World Congress and Event Coordinator). Haluk Dag, Jessica Tavares and Désirée Hostettler also served in a variety of roles as World Congress Assistants. Thanks to their enormous dedication and professionalism this unprecedented Congress relocation took place almost without a hitch.

If you have any questions, comments or suggestions, please contact either one of us before, during or after the World Congress. Your input and comments concerning previous Congresses were highly appreciated as they helped us to lay the groundwork for this meeting in Poznań. We hope this year's event meets, and even exceeds your expectations.



Who would have said, six months ago, that Poland would play host to the 24th World Congress of Political Science? The unfortunate events that transpired in Turkey obliged us, on a daily basis, to reassess what would be the best place to ensure the security of participants while offering them an environment conducive to true scientific exchange. We can only thank the members of the Polish Political Science Association, who

agreed to rise to the challenge of hosting the event in such a short time frame. I also hasten to thank the Turkish Political Science Association for their commitment to making the 24th World Congress a memorable event. Since Moscow in 1979, this is the second time IPSA stages a congress event in Eastern Europe, and we're very pleased to mark our return and to pursue our mission to promote the advancement of political science in all parts of the world, by establishing scientific networks connecting East and West, and North and South.

The World Congress of Political Science in Poznań will welcome some 3,000 political scientists from more than 99 countries. These participants are destined to become the new tercüman during this weeklong event. Their first order of business will be to better understand our rapidly changing world and above all explore the new forms of inequity emerging in the early blush of the 21st century. In order to do so, the "new" political scientist must be a sociologist, anthropologist, mathematician and diplomat at one and the same time. Multidisciplinary is the watchword, therefore.

As far back as the New France period, many young French people went to live among aboriginal peoples in order to better understand their language and customs. The French who integrated into aboriginal cultures were referred to as "truchements" (intermediaries) or interpreters.¹ Such is the challenge that lies before us today as political scientists, that of fostering a dialogue between researchers from the four corners of the world so that we can better *interpret* the myriad changes occurring within our societies.

The choice of the university city of Poznań was first and foremost the result of a stated desire on the part of the Polish Political Science Association to receive our community of researchers. For our association, this invitation also provided an opportunity to speak directly to our colleagues from Eastern Europe with the objective of developing new research projects and achieving a better understanding of all the changes taking place within Polish and European political life.

Today, being an internationalist is certainly less perilous than it was during the time of the Crusades, the road travelled less daunting thanks to that metal steed that allows us to span the world's oceans more rapidly. But it is always in a spirit of a quest and from a perspective of sharing the fruits of our research that we gather today in Poland. My wish is that Poznań 2016 will serve as an opportune moment for reflection on the future of our discipline as well as till the soil for productive new collaborations.

I have a dream of inviting the most prominent political scientists in the world to Poland for a World Congress. Dreams do come true, and it sometimes happens unexpectedly. A few years ago, nobody would have imagined that the sharply reduced level of security in the world and the region, and political unpredictability; including the limited extent of academic freedom, would be so immense relocate the 24th World Congress

that it would be necessary to relocate the 24th World Congress from Istanbul to Poznań.

I am tremendously grateful to our friends from the Turkish Political Science Association for the many years of hard work put into the preparation of the 24th World Congress. We are proud that we can benefit from their experience and continue their work.

Although the Congress' theme deals with the growing inequalities in the political world, debates will surely transcend that topic. Since February 2014, the strength of the bifurcation vector of the international order intensifies. The rapid rise of social processes contributes to the increasing levels of instability in political systems. In many countries, the protest parties with populist programs have risen to power and received above-average electoral support. One of the possible grounds of the research is to treat these processes as external expressions of tensions between the processes of corporate globalization and self-isolationism of counter-acculturation national communities. There are plenty of examples of these types of fields of research and new intellectual challenges which accompany them.

Undoubtedly, it is also necessary to rethink our social role – as researchers and analysts of social reality – if it runs counter to the world of politics. We lack the comfort of physicists whose research subjects are not subjective. Therefore, as it is necessary to follow the general principles of treating politicians the same way as criminologists treat criminals, and biologists white mice, it is also necessary to rethink and propose in what situations political scientists and the whole political science environment should also take political roles.

The research work is based on a never-ending pursuit of the truth. The above examples of problems, like many others, cannot be fully resolved during the 24th World Congress in Poznan. However, it is essential to constantly ask questions and seek more relevant answers. I am sure that this 24th IPSA World Congress in Poznań will play an important part in this endless history of studying the political world.

I wish you the best of luck in the debates and endless discussions on the important topics related to the world of politics.



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

The International Political Science Association (IPSA) was founded in Paris in 1949 under the aegis of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) to promote the development of political science throughout the world. As an international scholarly association, IPSA has a mission to:

- support the development of political science in all parts of the world, building academic networks linking East and West, North and South;
- create an inclusive and global political science community by ensuring a balanced representation along the lines of region, gender and experience in all of its activities;
- promote collaboration between scholars in emerging and established democracies and to support the academic freedoms needed for the social sciences to flourish;
- ensure that political scientists are strongly positioned to make a valuable contribution to the quality of public deliberation and decision-making and to our understanding of an increasingly interconnected political world;
- support the role of political science in empowering men and women to participate more effectively in political life.

Institutional Relationships

Starting with one in 1970, IPSA Research Committees are now a vast worldwide research network where all interested individuals are welcome to contribute. Research committees frequently publish their work and organize their own conferences. They each present a minimum of two panels at IPSA World Congresses, but in most cases many more. Joint panels between two or more RCs are strongly encouraged.



Congress Venues Map







AMU-Morasko Campus Plan

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


