

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



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#### **Words of Welcome**





Welcome to the 28th IPSA World Congress of Political Science, taking place in the dynamic city of Seoul, South Korea, from 12 to 16 July 2025. It is a pleasure to gather once again in person to share cuttingedge research, renew longstanding friendships, and forge new collegial connections. This Congress marks a significant moment for the international political science community and promises to be one of the most dynamic and globally inclusive gatherings in IPSA's history.

This year's Congress theme. Resisting Autocratization in Polarized Societies, was developed through a collaborative process involving the Program Co-Chairs, Dr. Azul A. Aguiar Aguilar and Dr. Irasema Coronado, in consultation with the Committee on the Congress Program (CCP), the

Local Organizing Committee (LOC), and the IPSA Executive Committee. The theme addresses one of the most urgent challenges confronting global democracies today: the erosion of democratic norms and the rise of autocratic regimes amidst deepening political polarization. It invites reflection and debate on the causes and consequences of these developments and encourages critical dialogue on pathways toward democratic resilience, pluralism, and inclusive governance.

The CCP has played a pivotal role in shaping the academic content of this Congress. Charged with advising on the program structure and overseeing the acceptance and distribution of panels and papers, the CCP ensures alignment with IPSA's values, including gender balance, regional representation, and linguistic diversity. Alongside the Program Co-Chairs, the CCP comprised Magdalena Musiał-Karg, Florence Haegel, Serge Granger, Berk Esen and Keiichi Kubo, with Euiyoung Kim and Ajin Choi serving as representatives of the LOC. Together, this team steered a rigorous peer-review process involving the review of more than 6,274 paper proposals, ultimately curating a diverse and intellectually rich program.

The Congress structure reflects the centrality of its theme. Congress Theme panels and roundtables, organized by invitation, feature leading scholars who will address critical aspects of autocratization, populism, and polarization. General tracks encompass a wide range of topics across the discipline, while Research Committee tracks drawing from more than 50 specialized areas—highlight the depth and breadth of political science research from around the world. Special Events include innovative formats such as informal café-style lunchtime gatherings focused on research methods and academic publishing, designed to foster mentorship and peer-to-peer exchange in a relaxed setting.

Plenaries will bring together prominent scholars and public figures. IPSA President Pablo Oñate will chair the Presidential Plenary, "Populism, Polarization and the Consequences for Democracy," featuring six distinguished scholars from different global regions and career stages. Among the keynote speakers are former United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, who will speak on "Liberal Democracy, Multilateralism, and Global Citizenship," Professor Donatella Della Porta, who will address "The Contentious Politics of Academic Freedom: Social Movements and Repression," and Professor Neera Chandhoke, whose keynote is titled "Resisting Legal Autocracy in South Asia." The Congress will also include sessions honoring recipients of IPSA's most prestigious awards.

This year marks a major step forward in linguistic inclusivity. For the first time, panels will be presented in languages other than English, French and the local language. A total of 21 panels will take place in Arabic, Spanish, Portuguese, Hindi, and Ukrainian, further advancing IPSA's commitment to accessibility and multilingual scholarship.

The Local Organizing Committee, in partnership with leading Korean academic and public institutions, has curated a number of special tracks, including sessions on Asian Politics, Korean Politics, International Relations of East Asia, and emerging political issues across the region. Collaborative programming with the Korean Political Science Association (KPSA), the Japanese Political Science Association (JPSA), and the Chinese Association of Political Science, Taipei (CAPS), adds further regional depth and dialogue.

The successful planning of this Congress has been made possible through the close collaboration between the IPSA Secretariat and the Local Organizing Committee. The LOC played a vital role in bringing the Congress to Seoul and securing the Coex as a world-class venue. The Program Co-Chairs and the CCP wish to extend their deepest gratitude to Yee-Fun Wong, Roksolana Bobyk, Stephanie Doughty, and to Kim Fontaine-Skronski, Ekaterina Kuzmenko, Mathieu St-Laurent, Halûk Dag, Éric Grève and Fernand Thériault of the Secretariat for their exceptional support and dedication throughout the planning process.

The 28th IPSA World Congress of Political Science stands as a testament to the power of global collaboration and shared intellectual commitment. The International Political Science Association (IPSA) was founded in Paris in 1949 under the aegis of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) to promote the development of political science worldwide. With over 4,000 individual members across all five continents, IPSA has also been successful in encouraging the creation of national and regional political associations and, today, there are close to 60 such collective members.

As an international scholarly association, IPSA has a mission to:

- Support the development of political science in all parts of the world, building academic networks linking East and West, North and South;
- Create an inclusive and global political science community by ensuring a balanced representation along the lines of region, gender and career development, in all of its activities;
- Promote collaboration between scholars in emerging and established democracies and support the academic freedoms needed for the social sciences to flourish;

#### **Code of Conduct**

#### Anti-Harassment Policy: Code of Conduct

The purpose of this document is to provide an authoritative statement of the expectations for conduct for all who participate in IPSA meetings and congresses. The code of conduct is a natural outcome of IPSA's commitment to maintaining and promoting a professional environment at its meetings and other organized activities, and it is guided by the conviction that the advancement of knowledge flourishes most readily in an atmosphere of constructive debate in which all members treat each other with dignity and respect.

The International Political Science Association (IPSA) brings together professionals from a variety of backgrounds and from a large number of locations around the globe. This diversity brings with it the potential for fruitful dialogue about research and policy, but also the possibility of disagreements among members. This code of conduct is designed to ensure that all are treated with dignity and respect, and that sensitivity and consideration guide our interactions while, at the same time, not limiting the substance or arena of our debate.

- 1) This code of conduct refers to relations between IPSA members, IPSA Secretariat staff, and other participants, and to their interactions in the course of IPSA activities.
  - a) IPSA activities include IPSA's governing bodies (Executive Committee, Council), world congresses, regional and committee meetings and workshops, and editing of IPSA's journals.
  - b) Some matters of professional ethics are under the purview of specific committees and are addressed elsewhere: for instance, plagiarism and academic freedom.
- 2) IPSA office holders, from the President and Executive Director to members of the Executive Committee (EC) and editors of IPSA journals, have a special responsibility to uphold and observe this code of conduct, promoting in the Association's activities a professional environment characterized by constructive debate and the treatment of all members and participants with dignity and respect.
- 3) IPSA recognizes that there is a distinction between victimization through harassment and legitimate, justifiable, and appropriate constructive criticism. Nothing in this document should be construed as a limitation on the ability of members and participants to constructively evaluate and critique one another's work.
- 4) Nonetheless, IPSA recognizes its duty to ensure that members and participants are not harassed. It further recognizes that this duty is of wider application and includes all members and participants, regardless of status or the time period.
  - a) Harassment can be defined as unwanted conduct (actions or comments) related to age, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, race, disability, religion, nationality, citizenship or any personal characteristic of the individual, which has the purpose (intentional) or effect (unintentional) of violating a person's dignity or creating an intimidating, hostile, degrading, humiliating or offensive environment for that person.
  - b) Harassment may include, but is not limited to:
    - i. Offensive, insulting, intimidating, or malicious behavior targeted at another person or persons;
    - ii. Abuse or misuse of power intended to undermine, humiliate, denigrate, or injure the person or persons toward whom such behavior is targeted;
    - iii. Actions or comments—persistent or isolated—affecting the dignity of people or individuals. The key is that the actions or comments can be experienced as demeaning and unacceptable;
    - iv. Sexual harassment or intimidation.

- 5) IPSA recognizes that members and participants who feel that they have been victims of harassment as defined in this code of conduct are entitled to pursue their case in a welcoming and non-threatening environment.
- 6) IPSA is committed to ensuring that complaints brought under this procedure shall not lead to the victimization or harassment of any individual.
  - a) The procedures for addressing grievances (detailed below) aim to resolve complaints in an informal way, whenever possible. At the same time, IPSA recognizes that punitive measures may be required to address some violations.
  - b) IPSA also is committed to ensuring that those who lodge complaints under this code are not subject to retaliation by respondents or third parties.
- 7) IPSA ensures that procedures are in place to address complaints of harassment. Such procedures provide for:
  - a) Timely handling of such complaints;
  - b) Fair and impartial handling of such complaints; and
  - c) Fair, impartial, and sensitive treatment of all parties affected by such complaints.
- 8) Congress and event participants should report—directly or through another IPSA office holder—a violation of the code of conduct to the IPSA Ombudspersons, which are appointed by the EC at its pre-World Congress meeting to serve until the next pre-World Congress meeting.
- 9) In cases where the reported behavior is ongoing, or where there is a question of immediate physical harm or danger, steps will be taken by IPSA officials to ensure the safety of participants, regardless of whether a formal complaint is pursued or not.
- 10) Participants have two options through which to pursue a complaint.
  - a) If the participant does not wish to enter into a formal investigation process, then IPSA can issue a notice. In these cases, the IPSA Ombudspersons will contact the person who is the subject of the complaint, inform them that a complaint has been made, and remind them of IPSA's Anti-Harassment Policy. The recipient of the notice will have the opportunity to respond to IPSA in writing, but no further formal investigation will be undertaken.
  - b) The formal investigation process will be handled in confidence, and the identity of the complainer will not be revealed to the respondent, except with the permission of the complainant. To proceed with the formal investigation process, the complaint must be made in writing and must include:
    - i. The name of the complainant;
    - ii. The name of the respondent;
    - iii. The nature of the conduct about which a complaint is being made, including, where possible, dates, times and locations;
    - iv. If appropriate, names of any participants who may have witnessed the conduct.



- 11) An investigation will be conducted by the Ombudspersons in every case where a formal complaint is made.
  - a) The Ombudspersons will ask the respondent to provide a written statement in response to the complaint. The Ombudspersons may also contact identified witnesses or consult with others with direct knowledge of the incident in question. All evidence should be given in writing (including email).
- 12) At the end of the formal investigation, the Ombudspersons will propose a resolution for the matter. Resolutions may include:
  - i. Determination that IPSA's policy has not been violated and that the complaint will be dismissed;
  - ii. Recommendation for informal resolution of the matter in order to re-establish a professional relationship between the parties, including options such as mediation;
  - iii. Termination of IPSA congress or event participation for the respondent, including current and/or future IPSA congress and
  - iv. A temporary or permanent restriction on the respondent regarding accession to leadership positions in IPSA, including the Executive Committee;
  - v. A temporary or permanent suspension of the respondent's IPSA membership.

- 13) The final decision regarding such proposals will be made by the EC, and the resolution of the matter will be notified to all parties in writing.
- 14) In any proceedings, IPSA will make every effort to protect complainants from retaliation. The information given by all parties and their identities will be treated with strict confidentiality. If anonymity becomes difficult to maintain in particular cases, IPSA will defer to the preferences of the complainant.
- 15) This code of conduct and its procedures for resolving grievances are not intended to, and are not a substitute for, the rights of any of the parties to seek legal redress. Any legal action on the part of the complainant will be exclusively a matter between the complainant, the respondent and the authorities in the location where the incident occurred. IPSA will not be a party to such legal action, nor will it accept any legal liability or financial responsibility for such action.

#### Awards

#### Kim Dae-jung Award (NEW)



The Kim Dae-jung Award was established to honor the legacy of Kim Dae-jung, the 15th President of the Republic of Korea (South Korea) from 1998 to 2003 and Nobel Peace Prize laureate in 2000. Sponsored by the Kim Dae-Jung Foundation, this new award celebrates the themes of global peace, democracy and human rights and will be handed to the recipient during a special roundtable session.

Recipient T.V. Paul

T.V. Paul is Distinguished James McGill Professor at the Department of Political Science at McGill University, Montréal, Canada, and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada. He served as the President of the International Studies Association (ISA) from 2016 to 2017, and is the Founding Director of the Global Research Network on Peaceful

#### **Global South Award**

Established to recognize the work done by a scholar from the Global South and whose scholarly contribution is focused on the relevant countries, regions and themes. The award also recognizes a cumulative body of work. It was awarded for the first time at the 2009 World Congress of Political Science.



Recipient Zaynab El Bernoussi

Zaynab El Bernoussi is a scholar specializing in dignity politics, international relations, and the international political economy. She holds a Master in Finance (MiF) from Instituto de Empresa, a Master of Public Administration (MPA) from Columbia University, and a PhD in Political and Social Sciences from the Catholic University of Louvain.

#### Karl Deutsch Award

The purpose of the Karl Deutsch Award is to honour a prominent scholar engaged in the cross-disciplinary research of which Karl Deutsch was a master. The recipient presents the Karl Deutsch lecture at the IPSA World Congress of Political Science. The award is made on the recommendation of the IPSA Committee on Organization, Procedures and Awards (COPA). It is supported by the Karl Deutsch fund.




Recipient Hyeong-ki Kwon





After several decades of significantly increasing global economic, socio-cultural, and political integration, the globalization pendulum is swinging back. But what comes "After Globalization"? The 26 chapters of this volume, originally presented at the Word Society Foundation's 40th anniversary celebration in 2022, address from different angles four core issues of "deglobalization": First, the re-conceptualization of world society and globalization within the current context of deglobalization. Second, the dynamics that are (re)shaping the world-economy, including processes of fragmentation, regionalization, reshoring and globa and regional polarization. Third, the current dynamics of global social and cultural structures, including new globalization cleavages, political mobilization, popular protest and resistance, and political participation and democracy. Fourth, the increasing great power conflicts and global rivalries and their impact on processes of (de)globalization.

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
















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
